PROGRAMA

ABSTRACT:

The aim of this Postgraduate Seminar is to introduce a new theoretical approach to help students understand the human being not as an "individual" but as a desiring, interactional creature. The theory consists of insights of psychoanalysis (Freud, Lacan, Irigaray, Christopher Bollas, Klein, Winnicott), and philosophy (Derrida, Lacan, Merleau-Ponty). This human development starts from the earliest parent-child relationships. Many contemporary Irish fiction writers focus on these vital interactions between mother and child, revealing different psychological types of mothers. In this course we will first look how a person is constituted, in conscious and unconscious, private and public aspects; second we distinguish between psychotic, perverse and neurotic mothers; third we see how motivation and resilience work.

JUSTIFICATION:

The overall theme is parent-child relations. First of all it is a topic of global relevance, so students can think critically about the different aspects that constitute a person (such as transgenerational material, childhood objects, development of an inner self). Second the selected texts will allow us to study the impact of certain institutions on family life, and how political systems form people's emotions. The fact that there are two different political systems in Ireland (North and South) could help to highlight the importance of (patriarchal) mentality on the protagonists. Third, the formal aspect will be scrutinized, as the layeredness of literary style is the perfect medium to illustrate the complexity of human interactions.

Choosing a majority of the texts published after 2010 should enable us to get a sense of how leading Irish authors look at the most fundamental issues of human interaction.

CONTENT:

First week:

- (1) Doireann Ni Ghriofa A Ghost in the Throat (2019): neurotic, creative mother
- (2) Patrick McCabe: The Butcher Boy (1992): psychotic mother-child relation
- (3) Kevin Barry's City of Bohane (2011): perverse mother

Second week:

Different forms of resilience in

- (1) Mary Morrissy's "Miss Ireland" (from the collection *Prosperity Lane*, 2016) subtly deals with the problems of the mother and baby homes in Ireland; Roisin O'Donnell's "Infinite Landscapes" (from the collection *Wild Quiet*, 2016): highlights how immigrant mothers & daughters deal with different cultures
- (2) Lucy Caldwell's "Through the Wardrobe" and "Inextinguishable" (from *Multitudes*, 2016) deal with LGTBQ+ matters and with surviving a death; "Jars of Clay" and "All the People Were Mean and Bad" (from *Intimacies*, 2021) looks at questions about abortion and the challenges of exhaustion
- (3) In Enright's "Caravan" (from "Taking Pictures" 2008) & "Nightswim" (*The New Yorker*, 2020) mothers struggle with a dark unconscious

Optional:

- Deirdre Madden's Authenticity (2002): neurotic mother (dead but inspiring)
- Doyle The Woman Who Walked Into Doors (1997): abused & abusing mother
- all other short stories by Morrissy, O'Donnell, Caldwell & Enright
